2. Executive Summary

Free schools and academies approved to open by the Department for Education must conduct a thorough and transparent statutory consultation with parents and local stakeholders before a final Funding Agreement can be put in place.

This is known as a Section 10 Consultation in reference to Section 10 of the Academies Act 2010. The Act states that you should consult such persons as the trust thinks appropriate. The key question for which trusts are required to consult is whether the trust should enter a Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State for Education.

As the trust proposed to open Foxbridge Primary School, Scholars Academy Trust devised and implemented a consultation exercise, supported by Premier Advisory Group. In this, we sought the views of parents, stakeholders and the wider community regarding whether Scholars Academy Trust should enter into a Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State for Education and open Foxbridge Primary School.

This report summarises the Scholars Academy Trust statutory consultation. The report includes details of:

- How the community was notified of the consultation
- The questions, answers and feedback received during the consultation
- Responses to issues raised during the consultation
- Materials used through the consultation (the Appendices).

Details about the consultation meetings and online survey were added to the school's website, Facebook page and printed on a leaflet. A set of bespoke emails/social media messages were sent to those community groups that Scholars consulted during the application for the new school, which enabled the community to provide their views on the entire process.

After approval from Scholars Academy Trust's Trust Board, we will present this report to the Department for Education and publish it for public access on the Scholars Academy Trust website.



3. Introduction

The Foxbridge Primary School is a proposed 4-11 primary school to open in Welsted Rd, Castle Donington, Derby, LE74 2SN by Scholars Academy Trust. In accordance with the statutory requirements, Scholars Academy Trust undertook a 6-week consultation period regarding the opening of the school. The consultation was open from 01/11/21 to 17/12/21.

The purpose of this consultation was to fulfil the statutory duty to inform the community of the plans for the proposed school, and to consult with stakeholders and the local community on their views. In particular, the consultation aimed to consult regarding whether ultimately the Scholars Academy Trust should enter into a Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State for Education for Foxbridge Primary School.

Of survey respondents, 90% supported the proposal to establish the school and 90% were in favour of the signing of the Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State for Education. There were no objections to the signing of the Funding Agreement raised through other channels e.g., via email or via the community consultation events.

The findings from this consultation are reported in the following document, including notes of all questions asked and summaries of answers provided by the trust. This document also includes an explanation of how the consultation was promoted and to whom.



4. Consultation methodology

4.1 Notifications of the Consultation

The Scholars Academy Trust website included details of the school's proposed admission policy, SEND policies and information for parents regarding school uniforms, school meals and wrap around care. Further to this, details about the consultation meetings and online survey were added to the school's website, forums including the Castle Donington community forum, Parish Council noticeboard and Netmums, and printed on a leaflet and distributed. These can be found in Appendix 4.

A database of local stakeholders in Castle Donington was collated, which included stakeholders in the following categories:

- Primary / Secondary Schools.
- SEN groups
- Faith groups / Churches
- Day-care providers
- Health services i.e., medical practices and hospitals
- Gyms, sports clubs and leisure centres
- Community groups e.g., youth groups, parent and toddler groups, libraries and theatres
- Media organisations, including radio, newspapers and magazines
- Leicester County Council Cabinet Members and Directors
- Local Councillors (North West Leicestershire Council, Leicestershire County Council and Castle Donington Parish Council)
- Leicestershire's MPs
- NASUWT, National Education Union Leicestershire representatives.

This database received regular email notifications regarding the consultation, the consultation survey, and consultation events. In addition, this database received the consultation brochure and all attached information (see Appendix 5), as well as a Zoom Guide ahead of the online consultation in order to assist accessibility. A full list of contacts on this database is included in Appendix 3.



In addition to contacting the above stakeholders, leaflets were distributed to in the area surrounding the school – largely throughout the Foxbridge Manor development surrounding the school site – and in the developer's offices. These leaflets included information about the consultation events and a link to the online survey.

4.2 Engagement mechanisms – Consultation Events and Survey

Two drop- in consultation events were organised:

- 18th November, 10:30 12:00, at the Castle Donington Community Hub
- 14th December, 18:00-19:00, over Zoom.

Each drop-in event included a presentation from Scholars Academy Trust representatives (shown in Appendix 6), and the opportunity for questions and answers from members of the public. Each event was attended by:

- Inderjit Sandhu (Executive Headteacher of Scholars Academy Trust)
- Pamela Bridgwood (Headteacher Designate of Foxbridge Primary School)
- Kathryn Priddey (Head of School Improvement)
- Mark Barrington (Chief Operating Officer)
- Representatives of the project management team, including Thomas Bostock and Tom Legge.

In addition to the events, an online survey was set up using SurveyMonkey. This can be viewed in Appendix 1. This survey comprised of six questions about the proposed school, each with space for respondents to add comments and explain their views. The survey was promoted via all notification emails and at consultation events. The results of the survey are reported below, in Section 5.

Scholars Academy Trust also encouraged contact via email, phone or by post. Of these routes, two emails were received by community members asking for further information, e.g., to be linked to admissions information, or for detail regarding the consultation events.



5. Results of the Consultation

5.1 Questions and responses from Consultation Events

5.1.1 Questions and responses from Consultation Event 18/11/21

How will Scholars ensure that the new school doesn't reduce places at the current local primaries? There are enough places for all three schools, and Scholars has received assurances that this is the case. Whilst the schools are not filling up yet, admissions applications are slow across the board in Leicestershire. Scholars is very conscious to not negatively affect other local schools and is committed to working with the other schools rather than against them on admissions, education and transition to secondary.

Who will teach in the school?

Pamela Bridgwood, the headteacher, has been appointed. In addition to this, the entire Scholars central team will be based at Foxbridge Primary.

How will governors be appointed?

Scholars will begin advertising for governors soon. Adverts will not ask for specific skillsets, but rather will be sifted for skills once received in order to ensure a rounded governing body.

How many schools are there in Scholars Academy Trust?

Scholars is a small trust, with two other primary schools. This allows the trust to spend lots of time in Castle Donington, and work closely with the community, staff, parents and governors for pupils. The Scholars team plan to be based at Foxbridge Primary once open.

Will the new primary engage with faith communities?

All Scholars schools engage with communities of all faiths, for example in organising trips to Churches as part of history and RE curriculums. All children will learn about British society, and



Scholars are very passionate to show the similarities in moral values and requirements of life between different faiths and communities.

Where did the name Foxbridge Primary come from?

The school's name arose from community consultations. Scholars asked for suggestions for the name, and then asked for a vote on the three most suggested options. Foxbridge Primary was a favourite from the beginning.

5.1.2 Questions and responses from Consultation Event 14/12/21

Is there sufficient demand for places in the region that warrants a new school?

There is a need for more school places in the LA due to large scale housing developments in the area, which is why the LA are supporting the development of the new school. The demand for additional places arises as a result of the development of 895 new homes currently being built on land off Park Road in Castle Donington, located within the North West Leicestershire District of Leicestershire. There are two further primary schools located within Castle Donington, both are popular and have a high demand for places and the new school would not only cater to the growing population within the region but also offer the opportunity to improve education generally by strengthening local partnerships and collaborative working and bringing new expertise and knowledge to the area.

Who will fund the new school? Will the school receive any additional funding from the LA for its operations?

Scholars Academy Trust is committed to providing adequate financial support to the Foxbridge Primary School ensuring that the operations of the school and its performance are not compromised at any cost. There is further post-opening funding for from the Local Authority as different year groups join the school.

What will the curriculum look like?

The learning journey will start in the reception class. Here children will follow the early years foundation stage curriculum with a key focus on learning through purposeful play to develop the child. As children progress through to key stage one and two children will undertake the variety of subjects required within both key stages. Much of the curriculum will be integrated into thematic approaches however basic skills of each subject will be taught so that the children can utilise them



across the curriculum. We will work with the parents to ensure the best educational and social provision is made to meet the individual needs of children.

Will the admissions policy of the school prioritise local pupils?

The admission policy aims to meet local demands. Children in the locality, and in particular the surrounding housing developments, are given preference in allocating the admissions.

How can parents/ carers get involved with the school and provide feedback?

The trust is committed to involving all the stakeholders in the operation and we greatly value the feedback provided by the parents. We constantly organise online parent surveys, coffee mornings for quick drop in chats, with an open-door policy from the headteacher.

How are staff recruited at the new school?

At the moment, the recruitment of teaching staff will be contingent on the number of pupils that we are catering to and the demand of places in the future.

What is the SEND Policy of the school?

The school is committed to meeting all the statutory requirements of our SEND local offer. We will also have our own personal SEND offer. Additional support will be provided where needed. Essential SEND training will be provided to the teachers.

Does the school have a uniform?

The uniform is ready and has been presented at the previous consultation and admissions events. The identifying colour of the school will be emerald green.

When can the stakeholders have a tour of the school?

We will be able to allow tours from August 2022, following handover of the school building from the developer and LA to the trust.

5.2 The SurveyMonkey Survey

The SurveyMonkey survey received a total of ten responses. The survey enabled each respondent to provide both quantitative and qualitative answers. Most stakeholders replied with a Yes/No answer, but respondents were also given an opportunity to further add comments about the new school. Questions asked within the survey were as follows:




- 1. Do you support the proposal to open a new primary school in Castle Donington?

The results to each of the six questions are presented below.

5.2.1 Stakeholder group

Respondents were asked which stakeholder group they identified themselves as belonging to and had the ability to select as many categories as they wished. Respondents also had the opportunity to provide additional details on who they were in a free text box.




Most respondents (50%) identified as local residents, followed by parent/carer of child(ren) due to start at a later period (20%).

5.2.2 Q1. Do you support the proposal to open a new primary school in Castle Donington?


Of the ten of respondents who competed this question, 90% answered Yes and 10% answered No.





5.2.3 Q2. Do you understand and support the proposed Admissions Policy for Foxbridge Primary?


Of the 10 of respondents who competed this question 80% answered Yes and 20% answered No



5.2.4 Q3. Do you support the proposed curriculum for Foxbridge Primary?


Of the 10 of respondents who competed this question 90% answered Yes and 10% answered No

6. Responding to the findings

This report summarises the findings of the genuine, open and honest consultation exercise undertaken by Scholars Academy Trust.

As outlined by the positive results, the proposed Foxbridge Primary School has substantial support from the local stakeholders. Some issues were raised to which Scholars Academy Trust has given further consideration and provided answers as follows:

 Survey: two of ten respondents said that they did not understand the school's admissions policy

It was also available via the trust website throughout the consultation. The policy has been approved by DfE and is in line with LA policy and the admissions policies of other schools in Castle Donington. - Survey: traffic in and around Castle Donington is problematic
 Traffic and transport issues are predominantly for the Local Authority and should have been negotiated between the Local Authority and developer (for Foxbridge Manor, Redrow) during the S106 and planning processes for the Foxbridge Manor Housing development. - Survey: whether the school should only be opening for Foundation Stage Children

 Foxbridge Primary is currently planned to open in reception only during the first year of
 opening, in line with the standard for new school openings. However, the Scholars

 Academy Trust team have undertaken financial planning to ensure that the school can
 open successfully to a range of year groups from the first year, if required by the growth
 of the housing developments around the school. The trust is in dialogue with the Local
 Authority to open admissions to further year groups if deemed necessary. If you have a

event. Summarised, these replies outlined that there are enough places for all Castle Donington primary schools given the new housing developments being built, and that the trust is in contact with the LA to be up to date in our assurance of this. In particular, the trust will not market the new primary for admissions outside of the housing development and new families moving into the Castle Donington area after National Offer Day, in order to reduce the new primary's impact on existing schools.



7. Conclusion

Responses to the statutory consultation survey demonstrate that the majority of the respondents were in favour of the proposal to establish Foxbridge Primary School in Castle Donington. The board of Scholars Academy Trust are hugely grateful of the great support given by the community.

Nonetheless, we take seriously all the issues raised and have sought to respond to them. We do not take community support for granted and will not allow ourselves to become complacent in our efforts to ensure that our plans for Foxbridge Primary School reflect the needs and aspirations of our community. We will report regularly on our advancements and progress to ensure local stakeholders are well informed and able to fully contribute to our plans.

We are committed to operating in a transparent and inclusive way, and in keeping with our vision and ethos. We will ensure our recruitment and other policies adhere to the very best practice in equal opportunities and inclusion and will make sure all staff and governor vacancies are widely advertised to the community. We will participate with local networks to develop partnership and collaborate with local community group, charities and private sector companies.

A relatively small number of response forms were returned and the attendance at the consultation meetings were fairly low. This can be attributed to a variety of reasons including the wide-ranging efforts of trust in researching, evaluating and communicating the plans for the proposed new school. It can also be attributed to the faith that stakeholders and the local community have in the leadership and decision making of trust to open and deliver the proposed school.

The range of questions asked at the meetings and listed highlights the issues discussed and illustrates the willingness of attendees to engage with trust about their plans.

This report fulfils Foxbridge Primary School's statutory requirement to consult with stakeholders about its proposal and Scholars Academy Trust can proceed with the next phase of the project's preopening, with the understanding that no significant barriers or opposition to their proposals have been identified. On the basis of the responses to the consultation, the Governors agreed they wish to enter into a Funding Agreement with the Secretary of State to open the school from 30th August 2022.





When full, the school will provide provision for a total of up to 210 pupils.

Curriculum and Delivery of Learning

Learning in Reception

The learning journey will start in the reception class. Here children will follow the early years foundation stage curriculum with a key focus on learning through purposeful play to develop the child. Outdoor learning will be paramount within their reception curriculum with opportunity for children to develop reading, writing and numeracy skills all woven through activities outside. The children will develop their independence and confidence through the activities they undertake at the start of their learning at school.

As children progress through to key stage one and two children will undertake the variety of subjects required within both key stages. Much of the curriculum will be integrated into thematic approaches however basic skills of each subject will be taught so that the children can utilise them across the curriculum.

Curriculum beyond Reception

In literacy the aim is to offer pupils intellectual excitement and challenge to provide them with a sense of delight and wonder about language. Text relevant to children experiences will be used to inspire them alongside need to study classical books to broaden their vocabulary and support their knowledge and understanding. Children's reading, writing, speaking and listening skills will be developed throughout the week and across the curriculum.

Mathematics will be taught on a daily basis and linked to other subjects as appropriate with the key aim of children being able to be fluent and develop reasoning skills to solve mathematical problems, skills which will provide a solid foundation for their future.

A high-quality science curriculum will be provided so that children lay the foundation for understanding the world through specific disciplines of biology, chemistry and physics. Children will be taught how science has changed our lives and how it continues to develop. We want the children to develop scientific knowledge and conceptual understanding through first-hand experiences of carrying out experiments and looking at the world more closely around them.

Foundation subjects such as history and geography will be covered throughout school. In history children will be taught how the past shapes our current lives and legacies that have been left by famous people and events. Geographical skills will be developed geography through fieldwork as well as classroom activity. Children will study the world around them both locally, nationally and internationally. Through the studies they will gain an understanding of how different people live across the world.



The study of art will give children the opportunities to appreciate the work of artists and craftspeople and draw inspiration from them for their own work. There will have opportunities to develop their skills and techniques in a range of media. Design and technology will enable children to look at designers and inventors and how some of the work is very much in evidence in real life today.

Music and drama will be used from around the world to enable children to appreciate different styles of music from a range of musicians and across the world. Within the Castle Donington school all children will have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument which we currently have in the trust schools.

Spanish will be taught to the children key stage 2 so that children can develop the links with schools in Europe. This will eventually lead to residentials abroad so that children have the opportunity to experience Spanish culture first hand and practice their language skills. This will also have links to the children's secondary education.

Religious education is the curriculum entitlement for all children and the Leicestershire grid syllabus for religious education will be followed so that children develop their understanding of the six major faiths.

Physical education will be developed at all times as active lifestyles lead to enhanced physical emotional social well-being for all children. Competitive sports will be encouraged alongside developing collaborative learning skills in team work.

Alongside the national curriculum requirements children will be taught about personal health social and citizenship to help them lead healthy lifestyles.

Extracurricular activities will be provided the children alongside booster classes as required.

The aim of all the children's time in school is to ensure that they are equipped with the appropriate skills confidence capability and attitude to be the future citizens of Britain.

Special Educational Needs

At the new school Scholars are committed to meeting the individual needs of all children and providing the highest quality of education by ensuring that the appropriate provision is made for each child. Scholars' schools have the expertise to support children with particular needs and will seek additional support from the relevant services when required. We will work with the parents to ensure the best educational and social provision is made to meet the individual needs of children.



Community

The community plays an important part within the curriculum. This will be nurtured and enhanced as the school grows. The school will endeavour to use local expertise and knowledge to enhance the learning experiences for our children. Local businesses, charities and services will form part of the base of that learning. We see the community developing beyond the Castle Donington area and will utilise our current relationships with other schools and services to further enhance opportunities for our children in the school.

Learning is a continuum that goes beyond the school day and we would want our children to understand that they carry on learning even after the school day ends. This is where parents and the local community are essential components of the educational system and at our schools are recognised as being important to the learning journey.



Admissions Arrangements - 2022

Introductory statement

Foxbridge Primary School is a new primary school that will open its doors in 2022 to reception age children. Working with parents and the local community the school will ensure that children fulfil their potential through the excellent education that will be provided at the school. The aim is to ensure that children have the knowledge, skills and experience through their learning within the primary phase to be ready for their secondary education. The school will ensure that the children build their confidence and have high aspirations for the future.

Admissions number

The school has an admission number of 30 for entry in year reception.

The school will accordingly admit this number of pupils if there are sufficient applications. Where fewer applicants than the published admission number for the relevant year group are received, the Academy Trust will offer places at the school to all those who have applied.

Application process

The local authority will process applications outside the normal local authority process for coordinating school offers. This means you will need to complete your LA common application form for your other choices of school in addition to a separate application for this school.

Applications for this school should be sent to Mark Barrington at the following address office@scholarstrust.co.uk. The closing date for applications is 25/03/2022.

Offers will be made on 19/04/2022. If we have not entered into a funding agreement with the Secretary of State opening the school by that date, they will be conditional offers and will be confirmed once we have a signed funding agreement.

Oversubscription criteria

'The criteria in this section apply to entry at reception phase of the school.

When the school is oversubscribed, after the admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care plan or a statement of Special Educational Needs naming the school, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below, in priority order:

- Looked after children and children who were previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to adoption, a child arrangements order, or special guardianship order,
 1including those who appear to the admission authority to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.2
- Priority will next be given to children living within the catchment area set out in the map at the end of
 this policy. Children living on the boundary line will be considered to be living within the catchment
 area.
- 3. Priority will next be given to children based on their exceptional medical or social needs or those of their parents. Each application must include evidence, from a medical specialist or social worker of the child's/parent's need and why they must attend this school rather than any other, based on those needs. If evidence is not submitted to the school or LA with the application, a child's or parent's medical or social needs cannot be considered.
- 4. Other children who do not live within the catchment area.

Tie-break

If in categories 2-4 above a tie-break is necessary to determine which child is admitted, the child living closest to the school will be given priority for admission. Distance is measured from the child's home to the front gates of the school in a straight line.

Random allocation undertaken by the local authority will be used as a tie-break in categories 2-5 above to decide who has highest priority for admission if the distance between a child's home and the academy/free school is equidistant in any two or more cases.

¹ A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).

² A child is regarded as having been in 'state care outside of England' if they were in the care of or were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation, or any other provider of care whose sole or main purpose is to benefit society. Section 23ZZA(8) of the Children Act 1989 (inserted by Section 4 of the Children and Social Work Act 2017).

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Fulfilling every child's potential

Random allocation will not be applied to multiple birth siblings (twins and triplets etc.) from the same family tied for the final place. We will admit them all, as permitted by the infant class size rules and exceed our PAN.

Late applications

All applications received by the school or LA after the deadline will be considered to be late applications. Late applications will be considered after those received on time. If, following consideration of all applicants the school is oversubscribed, parents may request that their child is placed on the school's waiting list.

Deferred entry for infants

Parents offered a place in reception for their child have a right to defer the date their child is admitted, or to take the place up part-time, until the child reaches compulsory school age. Places cannot be deferred beyond the beginning of the final term of the school year for which the offer was made.

Children reach compulsory school age on the prescribed day following their 5th birthday. The prescribed days are 31 August, 31 December and 31 March.

Admission of children outside their normal age group

Parents may request that their child is admitted outside their normal age group. To do so parents should include a request with their application, specifying why admission out of normal year group is being requested.

When such a request is made, the academy trust will make a decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case and in the best interests of the child concerned, taking into account the views of the headteacher and any supporting evidence provided by the parent.

Waiting lists

The school will operate a waiting list for the reception age group. Where the school receives more applications for places than there are places available, a waiting list will operate until the end of the first term after the beginning of the school year. This will be maintained by the Academy Trust and it will be open to any parent to ask for his or her child's name to be placed on the waiting list, following an unsuccessful application.

Children's position on the waiting list will be determined solely in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. Where places become vacant they will be allocated to children on the waiting list in accordance with

the oversubscription criteria. The waiting list will be reordered in accordance with the oversubscription criteria whenever anyone is added to or leaves the waiting list.


Appeals

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
