How is it taught?

Our PSHE curriculum covers all areas of safeguarding through each of the strands to a different degree. Assembly time is also used to promote personal safeguarding matters and explore themes.

We are sensitive in our teaching and recognise that some more sensitive subjects need to be taught at an age-appropriate level, or at a small group or 1:1 level where a more urgent need arises

We plan to constantly challenge children to think deeply about safeguarding matters and their own personal physical and mental wellbeing. We value pupils' questions and give them space for their own thoughts, ideas, and concerns.

We give pupils' opportunities across the curriculum to explore values, personal rights, responsibilities and equal opportunities that develop moral concepts that impact positively on safeguarding, which promote the British Values and the Protected Characteristics. We also use a variety of high quality texts to explore safeguarding issues.



What is PANTS?

Talk PANTS is a NSPCC campaign that helps children to understand that their body belongs to them, and they should tell a trusted adult if anything makes them feel upset or worried. Talking PANTS is about using simple, child-friendly language to give your child the confidence and knowledge to understand what is and isn't OK.

We use the PANTS teaching resources and the Pantosaurus book to deliver a whole school assembly, which is then followed by further teaching and discussions within the classrooms.

The Talk PANTS messages for children are practical, reassuring and age-appropriate.

What can I do to help?

It might feel daunting talking about safeguarding but there are a number of ways in which you can help:

- Ensuring that children have good attendance forms part of our safeguarding curriculum. We aim for 98% and above. Please help us with this by ensuring your child(ren) are on time for school each day. Contact school as soon as possible if your child is absent from school.
- Talk to your child(ren) about how to stay safe and who to talk to if they have concerns
- Report any concerns you may have about the welfare of a child to the school's Designated Safeguarding Team (see 'Who can I contact if I have a concern?' section).
- You can use websites, such as the NSPCC and Action for Children, to find supportive materials in managing uncomfortable conversations.
